

# **2022 Election Summary**

In Washington state, a blue wave came ashore as Democrats are probably going to be adding seats to their legislative majorities despite the traditional midterm election trends that should have helped Republicans.

While several days of counting mail-in ballots remain, after two days of counting the numbers show Democrats will addthree seats to their 57-41 House majority (increased to 60-38) and one seat to their 28-21 Senate majority (increased to 29-20). These margins give Democrats the ability to advance a progressive agenda - leaving business interests with a limited ability to put the brakes on dozens of legislative initiatives that are seen as anti-business.

At this point it is unclear what gave Democrats the boost to score so well at the ballot. Was it the politics of abortion, Trump fatigue or concerns that Democracy is at risk? Was it candidate quality? Did state redistricting benefit Democrats? Whatever it was, state Democrats overcame the headwinds of inflation, gas prices, mortgage rate hikes and anxiety about crime to not only hold their own but likely grow their majorities.

In federal races, U.S. Senator Patty Murray will return to DC given her wide margin over GOP challenger Tiffany Smiley, a political newcomer who ran a brilliant campaign. Democratic Rep. Kim Schrier has a solid lead for re-election in a seat that national Republicans hoped to flip. And in the 3<sup>rd</sup> District, there's a hotly competitive race to replace Republican Rep. Jaime Herrera-Beutler, who voted to impeach then-President Donald Trump and was defeated in the primary by GOP challenger Joe Kent.
